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Secret LORRIES BEARING code

SPECIAL LOGOS **TARGET** OF RTD **OPERATION**

KLANG: They carry stickers with words like Bunga Raya, 21 overloaded lorries with the Harimau, Datuk and Petronas. The names seem harmless was quoted by Bernama. enough, except that they are secret codes that spell corruption

and protection. These codes and emblems have been used by lorries for years, indicating how long such a clandestine racket has been going on.

However, things came to a head last Thursday when 21 overloaded lorries with the "Datuk" logo crashed through RTD roadblocks in Ipoh, and suddenly the game plan changed.

The Road Transport Department (RTD) has now gone on the offensive by launching an operation codenamed Ops Logo yesterday to crack down on overloaded lorries supposedly having these "immunity"

RTD enforcement director Salim Parlan said the lorries' logo stickers are supposedly signals that they are to be accorded special treatment by certain quarters and that they are protected by "tontos" (a term that refers to those who tail enforcement officers on their rounds so as to warn others).

"We launched Ops Logo after

Lorries with such stickers are said to have paid certain RTD officers "protection money" and sought the services of the tontos who would warn them of RTD roadblocks

Salim said the use of such stickers by overloaded lorries in trying to escape the law was rampant in the Klang Valley, Perak, Johor and Penang.

In the Klang Valley, lorries said to be enjoying "immunity" are those with the stickers CB, TNS, SYT, SHH, SKP, Bob, Transnet, Gajah Tunggal (Lone Elephant), Roda (Wheel) and Five-Pointed Star.

In Perak, the stickers come in the form of Menara Condong (Leaning Tower), Harimau (Tiger), Bunga Raya (Hibiscus) Kunci (Key) or logos of Kuala Lumpur, Perak, Kelantan, CSH, Petronas, Datuk, MLT, See Hup and L. Thian.

Penang lorries have simpler stickers which include RL, 529, BSK, 383 and PT.

On claims that some RTD officers are protecting lorries with such stickers, Salim said the department is probing such

claims in several states. He added that stern action has

been taken against overloaded lorries with 69,499 cases in 2005 rising to 83,862 cases last year.

The RTD will also be using mobile weighing machines to check overloaded lorries, thus speeding up enforcement action unlike previously when the lorries had to be taken to weigh stations.

"Twenty mobile weighing machines costing RM100,000 each will be bought by year

end," said Salim.

The use of secret code to signify protection by certain groups was also detected a number of years ago when gambling horse-racing machines were the rage in entertainment centres. In several raids covered by newspapers, some machines had unusual codes that did not mean anything to the public. But those in the know say that the code was a signal to enforcement officers that money had been paid for protection.
